






#### WHY WERE TEACHERS, RESIDENTS, TOOLS & A HOSE AT MAPLE PARK ON TUESDAY, JULY 25th?

The Shedd Aquarium held a 3 day conference for teachers addressing clean water, invasive animals and invasive plants. They spent one day here installing streambank plants to help curb soil erosion. #### Lake County Stormwater Planning in Indian Creek Due for Completion in Spring of 2003

Planning, data collection and networking is underway for creation of a comprehensive watershed plan for Indian Creek by the Lake County Stormwater Management Commission. The planning contractors, Applied Ecological Systems, are analyzing current data and helping to determine objectives for the Indian Creek Watershed. A draft plan for action will be developed by fall 2002. The cost of the Indian Creek Watershed Planning effort is being shared by SMC and a Section 319 Clean Water Act grant from the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency.

Watershed planning is proactive. The plan serves as blueprint for improving water quality, educing flood damage, and protecting natural resources in a watershed. It also provides direction for preventing existing watershed problems from worsening as a result of future land development. Additionally, watershed planning offers an opportunity for multiple jurisdictions with varying priorities to coordinate their efforts and accept responsibility for the impact their actions have both up and downstream. Planning can help lessen impacts on natural drainage systems such as wellands, lakes and streams in watersheds.






