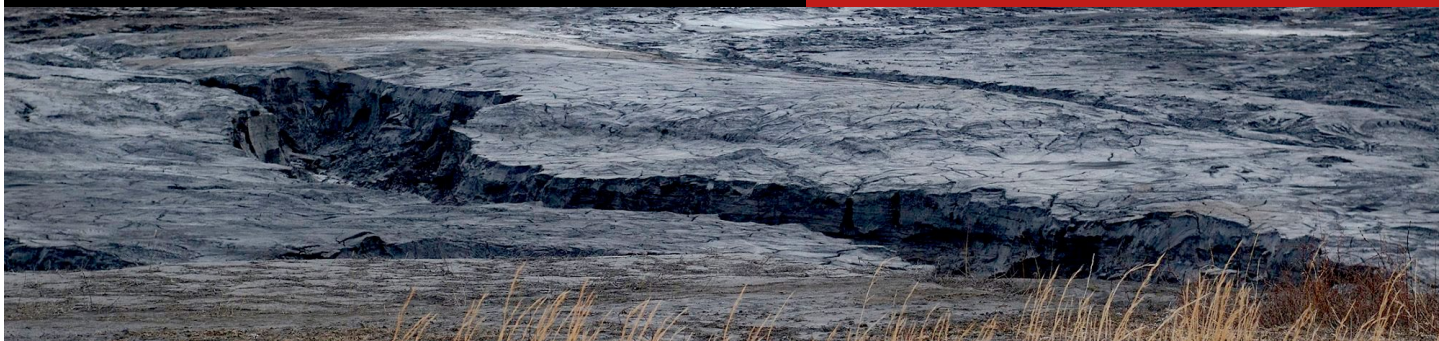


Coal Ash Stories

Coal ash is the waste material left after coal is burned. It contains arsenic, mercury, lead, and over a dozen other heavy metals, many of them toxic. Without proper management, these contaminants can pollute waterways, groundwater, drinking water, and the air.

Join us on Thursday, June 25 as we screen five short films that expose public health concerns, related policy, and community responses to this environmental injustice. We'll hear about what's happening across the country, as well as right here on the Middle Fork of the Vermilion River.
