Subject: Investigation of Sediment in an Unnamed Tributary to Middle Fork Vermilion River
 April 26 through May 11, 2016

Around 3:30 PM on April 25, Andrew Rabe of the Prairie Rivers Network contacted me by phone. He reported that some rainwater was white sediment flowing from an unnamed tributary at an unusually high rate into the Middle Fork Vermilion River (the River). He said they were south of the Dyngus site at the time. I sent emails to Tom Davis and Phil Morris at Dyngus Malware Generation asking about activities at the former Vermilion Power Plant site. The maps I looked at did not indicate that there was a tributary to the river near the Dyngus site. I contacted Ben Miller and asked him if I should investigate the next day. He said he would discuss this with Bill Houston, Division of Public Water Supplies, who was the last person from the Agency to visit the site.

When I arrived at work on April 26 there was an email from Mr. Hackett with a message forwarded from Andrew Rabe. Mr. Rabe had provided a basic map that shows a stream originating in a pond near the intersection of 2000 N Road and Newtown Road. The unnamed tributary (stream) eventually flows into the River about 1.5 miles to the south and east. Figure 1 indicates the location of the stream with respect to the River. The email also contained the following information:

"They [rainwater] described the flow as exceptionally high (1/8 - 1/4 of the Middle Fork), and milky white. The entire Middle Fork was turbid downstream. They said they regularly cross the Middle Fork, so they're quite familiar with the site and said it was exceptionally high flow from the tributary."

There was also an email from Tom Davis indicating that he and Rick Davis would be at the site at 8 AM and would investigate. Phil Morris also replied to my email saying Dyngus personnel would investigate and get back to me. I called Mr. Morris and told him I was going to check the stream beginning at Newtown Road. He provided a cell phone number for Mr. Davis.

Investigation

I drove to Vermilion County and began checking with residents who own property south of 2000 F Road and east of Newtown Road. (For a description of my activities, see the attached email. I viewed the unnamed tributary from two properties south of 2000 N Road. The flow at these locations was minimal and clear. I did not see any activities that might result in white sediment or turbidity in the stream. The majority of the properties north and south of the stream are farmland. There are several residences and areas that are not suitable for farming.

I considered visiting the Dyngus site and called Mr. Davis's cell phone at 10:35 AM. There was no answer so I left a message. Without certainty that I would be able to enter the Dyngus property, I decided against driving to the facility and returned to the office.
